At AS the course covers 2 key areas:

Political systems, processes and goals,
Social and economic trends and constraints,
Explanation and evaluation of human behaviour,
Beliefs, values and moral reasoning,
Media and communications,
Creativity and innovation.
- Unit 2: The Scientific Domain
Characteristics of the sciences (physical, life and earth),
Understanding of scientific methods, principles, criteria and their application,
Mathematical reasoning and its application.

Summary of assessment scheme

AS	Unit 1: The social and cultural domains (70%) 120 marks. 2 hour exam.	This paper has four sections: Section A: Candidates focus on the Cultural Domain and are provided with focused resource material on which they answer a series of short, structured questions. Section B: Candidates focus on the Cultural Domain and are required to write at greater length on one of three topics. Section C: Candidates focus on the Social Domain and are provided with focused resource material on which they answer a series of short, structured questions. Section D: Candidates focus on the Social Domain and are required to write at greater length on one of three topics. Candidates answer all of Sections A and C, and one question in Sections B and D as indicated.
	Unit 2: The Scientific Domain (30%) 60 marks. 1 hour exam.	This paper has two sections: Section A: Candidates focus on the Scientific Domain and are provided with focused resource material on which they answer a series of short, structured questions.
